t 2.30 pm on 30th September, the church was full for the Service of Dedication and Thanksgiving for St Helen's new Community Heritage Centre.

Members of the St Helen's congregation past and present were joined by Heritage Lottery Fund staff, local councillors, individuals and representatives of all the groups and organisations who have worked over the past 9 years to make our dream a reality.

Heather Broughton from *Heritage Lottery* spoke warmly at the after service reception about the success of the project and Councillor Virge Richichi presented a plaque from the District Council. As a further memento of the occasion, Ashby Congregational Church Minister, Rev Catherine Booton, presented a framed photograph of St Helen's, taken by a member of their congregation.

The reception provided an opportunity to catch up with friends, old and new, and to examine in detail the recently installed Heritage displays.

Research Group News

id you know that we have an active research group which meets in the Hildersham Room in the Heritage Centre? We have a formal meeting once a month, usually on a Tuesday, and the room is available to research volunteers all day every Tuesday, when they can come in and use one of our Heritage Laptops for their own research into life at St Helen's over the centuries. We have wi-fi throughout the Centre and a subscription to 'Find My Past', which - among other things - gives us access to extensive birth, marriage and death records, census records from 1831-1911, the 1939 register (produced on the eve of World War II) and national newspaper archives.

Every so often, we are joined by our professional researcher, Susan Payne, who is based in Lincoln, and who has already led us through the Lincoln archives, including an exciting glimpse of the 12th Century Bishops' Rolls.

Heritage Talks

ur first talk was on Monday 2nd October, when Mrs Margaret King travelled from Northamptonshire to talk to us about Ithiel Smart, who was vicar at St Helen's between 1622 and his death in 1661.

Mrs King's interest in him stemmed from the fact that he was vicar in her own parish of Wombourn before moving to Ashby. She has been researching Ithiel Smart for many years and has learned much about his family, though there are still questions to be asked, especially around the intriguing contents of both his and his widow, Dorcas's, wills. Smart's own will contains this bequest: "I give to all those ministers that now supply Ashby lectures one pair of black gloves and a ribbon and 12d a piece for their dinner at Joseph Foster's house on the day of my funeral."

His valediction in the Church Burial Register reads: "Mr. Ithiel Smart, Minister of Ashby, a worthy and faithful servant of God, a famous Divine and a painful Preacher, ye comfort of God's people in his time, departed this life ye 22nd. November and was interred in the Chauncel of our Parrish Church in Ashby ye six and twentieth of November 1661."

The talk was well received by an audience of around 20 people.

much larger audience greeted former County Archaeologist Peter Liddle, when he came on 6th November to talk about 'Houses of the Hastings family in Leicestershire.' As well as Ashby Castle, they had homes (at various times) at Kirby Muxloe, Donington Park and at Abbey Park in Leicester. Extensive work at Kirby Muxloe started in 1881, suggesting that the workmen moved there from Ashby once work on church and castle here were complete.
